At a time of economic uncertainty for many, the RBAI Together giving day last spring captured the imagination of our parent and alumni communities alike. An impressive £203,242 was pledged by 356 donors over a 36 hour period in support of our bursary programme and a number of school projects.

Alongside more visible fundraising activity, we are grateful for a number of legacy gifts this year. Legacies are a powerful and personal way for Instonians to recognise the part that RBAI has played in their life, knowing the impact of their gift will be felt by many pupils in the future.

I would like to place on record my sincere thanks to everyone who supported RBAI Together and the ongoing work of Peter Anderson, RBAI Foundation Director, and the Foundation Office this year.

The Foundation Office continues to actively support the work of the Belfast Old Instonians Association, providing administrative capacity, promoting the Association via social media and helping to organise and promote the London and Edinburgh dinners.

Looking ahead, the Board of Governors are committed to providing the best facilities and resources possible to support our pupils on their educational journey. Following a positive public consultation last autumn, the School is actively pursuing planning permission for the proposed South Wing Development. Plans include 15 new classrooms, a drama suite, a multi-purpose Dining Hall and 25m swimming pool.

This development will transform our campus, providing fit for purpose facilities to support the educational needs, growth and development of our pupils and staff.

Thank you again for your support. I trust you will be greatly encouraged as you read this report and consider how philanthropy is making a tangible difference to our pupils.

MODELLING EXCELLENCE, RESPECT AND PARTICIPATION

YOUR SUPPORT AT WORK

Based around a series of short films celebrating the ethos and shared history which make the Instonian community special, the RBAI Together giving day demonstrated the depth of support parents and alumni feel for the School.

£203,242 was donated in support of bursaries and a range of school projects. Every gift received has been put to work for the benefit of pupils.

Oliver's story on page 8 provides insight into how donations designated for bursaries are creating life changing opportunities for pupils from a wide range of backgrounds.

Generous donations received for video analysis equipment means a wider range of hockey and rugby teams are benefiting from video analysis, ensuring participants develop their technique, movement and tactical awareness.

With the number of participants growing significantly following the pandemic hiatus, the drama society have been able to purchase additional resources and upgrade their rehearsal studio.

The new academic year will see state of the art cameras and screens installed in the Common Hall once necessary structural work is completed.

- Engaging a wider range of pupils in art, encouraging creative thinking.


ROBOTICS CLUB

Having won the Northern Ireland Regional Final of the 'FIRST Tech Challenge UK Championship', RBAI's Robotics team recently travelled to Cambridge University to compete in the world's largest robotics competition for young people.

Funding from the giving day enabled the team to build and programme a custom-made robot capable of undertaking a range of tasks, including demonstrating the ability to move autonomously using artificial intelligence.

The School's Robotics Club helps bridge the gap between the classroom and the workplace by using robots as a tool to equip pupils with practical skills, inspiring them to explore future careers in the technology sector.

Member of the Robotics Club, Jay Jayaprakash commented, "Having spent lots of breaktimes and lunchtimes perfecting our robot, it was amazing to compete against the best schools in the UK."



A PROUD HISTORY AND EXCITING FUTURE FOR RBAI SWIMMING

RBAI Governor Ian Corry (RBAI 1970-77) was 14 years old when he represented Northern Ireland at the 1974 Commonwealth Games in New Zealand. He was a finalist at the Canada games four years later.

As Convenor of the RBAI
Foundation Committee, Ian
reflects on the legacy of RBAI's
existing swimming pool and
how its replacement, as part of
RBAI's South Wing Development,
can bring a new dawn for future
Commonwealth and Olympic
athletes.

NO RUNNING DEEP END

PEAK YEARS

Memories of about 4,000 miles swum in that water are mostly very mundane, reciting Latin and French conjugation for homework while anticipating the next tumble turn.

However we did have our moments. In 1973, Robert Howard and I undertook a sponsored Ulster record break for charity. Robert set a new Ulster 200m Backstroke record while I broke the Junior 400m Medley. The donation pledged was 10p for every 10th of a second we shaved off the records. An expensive surprise for sponsors was alleviated by the £5 maximum payment.

In 1978 the RBAI pool was our base as we entered the Guinness Book of Records, setting a new world record for a 100 mile relay by 16 swimmers, in a time of 24 hours 24 minutes.

Under the guidance of our coach Con O'Callaghan, the 1970s were the peak years for the RBAI pool. Belfast swimming clubs were in decline as the city closed at night. Competitive swimming moved from clubs to schools and we endured some very cold sessions in the RBAI pool during the world oil shortage crisis and various local political strikes which closed the power stations.

At a time when the trend for swimming training had become a slow slog of high mileage, we devised high pressure training sessions with short simulations of race pace. This led to RBAI's first win in the British Schools' Medley Relay (1973) and the first win in the Freestyle equivalent – the Bath Cup (1979), having placed second in five years of the previous eight years.

INTERNATIONAL SUCCESS

That decade brought five Commonwealth Games blazers, including two finalists. Robert Howard reached a Commonwealth final while still in sixth form. 1974 and 1975 also brought the only Irish Schools' Water Polo titles in our history.

Since then, three more alumni have competed at the Commonwealth Games and two have become Olympians. Most recently Jack McMillan swam the 16th fastest 200m time in the 2021 Tokyo Olympics, setting a new Irish record. This summer he will represent GB in the Paris Olympics, helping them defend their 4 x 200m relay Gold medal.

A POOL FOR EVERYONE

The swimming pool history represents much more than success in elite competition. It has been used by more than 9,000 pupils over the past 60 years and is a key asset on the main School site. It is typically used 12,500 times each year for PE alone.

On the recommendation of specialist engineers, the pool will be demolished over the summer, to be replaced by a 6 lane, 25 metre pool as part of the proposed South Wing development.

For the next 60 years and beyond, pupils will benefit from a modern, energy efficient pool with a movable floor, creating flexibility and facilitating everything from learn to swim to competitive water polo, canoe instruction, sub aqua and competitive swimming.

Many of us will remember loose rows of shaky blue spectator benches.

They've gone long ago. The new pool will have enough seats for parents and pupils to watch competitions or for multiple teams in a tournament. Even House Water Polo requires enough spectator space for 6 teams with subs and supporters.

A SWIMMING HUB FOR THE FUTURE

At a local level we will continue our community engagement through learn-to-swim, club training and competition. The new pool brings the potential for RBAI to become a centre for elite training in Belfast, overlapping external club coaching with school swimming and water polo.

The potential for sporting success is a strong feature of RBAI recruitment. The swimming pool will be the most prominent on-site sports facility.

More than £1 million has already been pledged towards the cost of the new pool through the Excellence for All campaign and we are grateful to each of those donors. In the words paraphrased by Con O'Callaghan in a 1970's School News report, the ongoing support of the Instonian community will "make our desires match our opportunities."

TRANSFORMATIONAL BURSARIES

When Oliver Hodkinson received a bursary to join RBAI from Tir-na-Nog Primary School in Ballyclare, he never dreamt he would be studying Computer Science at Oxford University seven years later.

Oliver had been won over by the range of clubs and societies at Open Day and unperturbed by the forty minute bus journey each morning, Oliver quickly settled into RBAI.

Discovering a passion for Fencing led to strong friendships and by the end of his third year, Oliver was part of the RBAI team which won the U16 Irish Interschools Team Fencing Championships, defeating Clongowes Wood in the final.

Oliver demonstrated great ability in STEM subjects, developing a keen interest in coding. Alongside his own projects, he mentored the Year 9 & 10 team which won QUB's Schools Coding Competition during his final year at school.

One of two bursary recipients to matriculate to Oxford University this year, Oliver is grateful for the opportunities RBAI gave him;

Whilst fees remain at a fraction of those charged by public schools offering a similar pupil experience in Great Britain, some parents of prospective pupils and those already at the School have difficulty funding their son's education.

Funded through donations from alumni, parents and friends of the School, RBAI's Bursary Programme is a means tested, confidential programme, providing fee relief for up to 10% of pupils at the School.

A NEW SOUTH WING **ON THE RBAI CAMPUS**

In the autumn of 2023, the School announced plans for a new proposed South Wing on the RBAI Campus.

Subject to planning approval, the new building will include 15 general classrooms, a drama suite, a 25m swimming pool, a multi-purpose Dining Hall and the development of landscaped zones.

WHY THIS DEVELOPMENT IS NEEDED

Teaching and learning styles are constantly evolving, the use of technology is advancing, along with the recognition that having a positive learning environment is critical to pupils' mental health and wellbeing.

RBAI is restricted by buildings which were designed for a very different era and an extensive review of the School's estate highlighted:

- The classrooms in the 1920's W Block no longer meet the Department of Education space standards and are not fit for purpose.
- With more than 12,000 individual usages each year, the Swimming Pool which was built in the 1960s, and the 1950's Dining Hall, serving over 700 boys daily, are no longer fit for purpose.
- COVID showed that high quality internal and external spaces are essential for the wellbeing of pupils and staff.

A SCHOOL FOR THE FUTURE

- RBAI's proposals will provide the necessary school infrastructure, with high quality, efficient buildings designed to be adaptable and flexible in meeting the needs of evolving curriculum requirements.
- The development of new landscaped zones will improve pupil and

- Near Zero Carbon development will see energy inefficient buildings replaced with new infrastructure, significantly reducing the School's carbon footprint.
